STUDENT VOLUNTEERING

The Department of History is keen to encourage its students to undertake voluntary work with organisations and causes they are passionate about. We believe that voluntary work gives you invaluable insight into how such institutions and organisations work, and also allows you to engage in the building of new relationships within your communities. We are also keen to help equip you for the competitive job-market that you will face after graduation. We see volunteering as a key method by means of which you can develop a variety of skills you should be able to transfer to the world of work.

The Department currently has a sum of money from the Essex Alumni Fund, which we have matched with Departmental funds, in order to assist any students who do get involved with the volunteering scheme with their travel expenses. If you are interested in getting involved you should follow the instructions below.

~ Get Involved in Six Easy Steps ~

- 1. **Decide** on a cause or interest you are passionate about. See below for some suggestions. We think it's great when you can volunteer for a cause that utilises your History skills, but do what you love.
- 2. **Get in touch** with the organisation and email Matthew in History (mdavieb@essex.ac.uk) to let us know when you start.
- 3. Many organisations will then **interview** you, either in person or by phone (some have slightly different recruitment procedures; do ask about these when you first get in touch).
- 4. Assuming all goes well at interview, you will work out with the organisations exactly what sort of work they need doing/what you would prefer doing for them. The expectation is that **you will make at least 10 volunteering visits** of your choice, at mutually convenient/agreed times.
- 5. The Department of History will pay each student volunteer who has made a minimum of 10 volunteering visits **up to a maximum of £150 towards travel expenses**. Please remember to keep your receipts/tickets so that these can be processed for our records. Also, don't forget your vTeam passport and to have your organisation sign off on your hours.
- 6. Volunteer hours can go towards **The Big Essex Award**. Email bige@essex.ac.uk to sign up and visit https://www.essex.ac.uk/careers/bige for more information. It looks great on your CV and it's a wonderful way to expand your jobs skills.

Stories from fellow History Volunteers:

Kyle Cameron-Symes (BA Modern History) Volunteer at Essex Police Museum

I asked the history office about the opportunities available for volunteering around Essex. In addition to helping at the history department library, I was kindly directed to a list of the different placements available. I thought many looked interesting, but settled on The Essex Police Museum. I had been to it on a trip for one of my modules, and remembered that they were looking for volunteers when I went there. So, how was my time there?

Well, the first thing I noticed was how friendly the people who worked there were, the curator was really welcoming. From the start I had a great deal of freedom in choosing what tasks I could help out with. I was mainly focused on the public facing side of things, in helping to open up and close the museum, answering enquiries, manning the phone and supporting with the craft activities that are held, helping educate many about the museum and different aspects of police history. Also, I was lucky enough to work behind-the-scenes and help with archival work. I found this really rewarding as I was being a part of preserving history. In addition, I was given the opportunity to network, and was provided with free training courses which really helped me out.

It was a worthwhile experience; it provided me with skills that before were missing from my C.V., as well as a great opportunity to meet interesting people and was a great confidence booster as well! I hope that this helps you think about the benefits of volunteering and you consider giving it a go, there are even one-off events at some places that you can try, to see if it's for you. So... what are you waiting for?

Laura Kambanis (BA Modern History) Volunteer at the Colchester Castle Museum

I will be volunteering at Colchester Castle for two months from the 13th of October until the 13th of December. The role mainly involves talking to visitors and generally invigilating at the exhibit which is called 'The Treasures of China'. The exhibit promises to display seventy of the treasures from Nanjing Museum- the second largest museum in China. It begins with the rise of Imperial China from the earliest Stone Age tombs until the fall of the last Emperor, which encompasses 4500 years of Chinese history. Among the objects, visitors can expect to see a 2000-year-old, jade suit from the tombs of the Han Dynasty rulers.

This role will allow me to work with the original, invaluable objects from that time and to experience a museum environment from the inside, in order to discover what is involved in its every day functioning. It will also give me the opportunity to learn more about the period and to bring the exhibit to life by learning some interesting facts to tell visitors! I hope to improve my skills of communication with the public and to gain some valuable contacts should I consider pursuing a career working in a museum after graduation.





Jack Fitzpatrick (BA History and Literature) Volunteer at the Royal Gunpowder Mills

I volunteered at the gunpowder mills in Waltham Abbey and quickly found myself a proper armoury steward, responsible for over 200 historic firearms and giving tours all on my own. It's been really wonderful and I really think museum work might be suited to me. Sorry to blow my own trumpet even more, but they actually got an email praising me from a visitor.

Alex Treptow (BA Modern History and Politics) Volunteer at the Essex Police Museum

The first thing I did was sort out and number all of the 'oversized photos'. For example, my categories may have been anything from land vehicles, to sport-related ones, to animal-related ones etc. Once they were sorted into their categories, I then had to number them, so that they could be put into their database. The second thing I did was help to create a new feedback system for the museum. This was only started the last time I was there, though I did help a little more online. I created more simple questions for the kids, and more informative ones for the parents. I also helped redesign the layout so that museum-goers were more likely to take part in the feedback process.

Hayley Clark (BA History) Volunteer at the Colchester Recalled Oral History Project

I volunteered at Colchester Recalled Oral History Project from April to August and really enjoyed my time there. The project aims to create an archive of recorded memories about Colchester over the past 100 years. The work I carried out while volunteering mainly consisted of listening to the tapes of interviews that had been carried out with local residents, and typing a transcript or summary of these interviews, so that there was a record of what each tape contained.

It gave me great experience of working with these types of sources, something that I had not had the opportunity of doing before, and working in this type of office environment. I listened to a wide range of interviews, such as those surrounding how Colchester had changed, people's experiences of World War Two and description of people's careers in Colchester in some of the main businesses that are present in the town.

Everybody there is a volunteer, meaning that there was a really nice atmosphere where everybody seemed to be very interested in the project and ensuring that it is a success. It was extremely interesting listening to the interviews and learning about peoples' lives and how Colchester has changed over time. I am grateful for having this opportunity, which was interesting, informative, enjoyable, and helped me add experience to my CV.
